

An in-person study day on the theme of Sanctuary, co-organised by Fiona Macintosh, Marina Warner, and A.E. Stallings, combining academic papers, a panel discussion, and live performances. Speakers include Oliver Taplin (Oxford), David Greig (playwright), Anthony Bale (Cambridge), A.E. Stallings (Oxford Professor of Poetry), and Elena Isayev (Exeter). Helen Mountfield (Principal of Mansfield College), will chair a panel on 'How can sanctuary work today?', with Nadina Christopoulou (co-founder of the Melissa Network), Clelia Bartoli (Palermo), Esa Aldegher (Glasgow) and David Herd (Kent), with a response from Mark Goldring (Asylum



Welcome). The above sessions will take place at All Souls, and from 3.45pm at St Hilda's there will be a series of performances, including a workshop led by Dine Diallo (Giocherenda, Palermo), a reading by A.E. Stallings, a scene from Dan Byam Shaw's *Asylum Seekers*; and an ode from *Oedipus at Colonus*, directed by Alex Silverman. Due to limited capacity at All Souls, booking is required to attend the papers and panel discussion; all are welcome to attend the performances at St Hilda's.


### Alexander Zeldin in conversation Monday 11 November at 2pm Lecture Theatre, loannou Centre, Oxford
