1. Oral-formulaic lines and enjambment

a. Homer, Odyssey, 1. 1-2

άνδρα μοι ἔννεπε, μοῦσα, πολύτροπον, δς μάλα πολλὰ πλάγγθη...

b. "Politics as Usual," Jay-Z (Shawn C. Carter), Reasonable Doubt (1996)

Kids stop

They greetin' me.

I'm talking

Sweet to keys

Cursing the very God that brought this

Grief to be

My life is based on sacrifices,

Jewels like Isis

c. "Jesus Walks," Kanye West, College Dropout (2004)

A truck full of coke, rental car from Avis

My mama used to say only Jesus can save us.

Well, mama, I know I act a fool

But I'll be gone till November; I got packs to move.

2. Performance, Technology and Community

- a. On Ralph Ellison (not part of my talk but relevant): "[Ralph] Ellison's capacious technological and humanistic imagery undermines the popular model of equating technological development with freedom—particularly freedom from fear....Fear can lurk everywhere for the African American person who survives in a world where 'the very ground on which they must fight, continues its offensive against them' [Ellison, 'The Way It Is' quoted]" (Lieberman 2015: 21-22).
- b. Nabeel Zuberi argues: "One of the goals for the descendants of displaced Africans has been the construction of future pasts that link them to others in diasporic time and space" (2007: 286).

3. "Oral Literature" and Anthropology

- a. Alfred Kroeber at University of California, Berkeley, "a powerful symbol that continues to evoke exclusion and erasure for Native Americans."
- b. "Juan Garcia was struck by how often Parry referred to 'race' in his master's thesis—six times in one brief section alone" (Garcia 2001; Kanigel 2021: 65).
- c. The comparison of "Yugoslav peasant singers to Homer...remain[ed] unsettling to many Hellenists. Cf. the comment by Hugh Lloyd Jones (1992: 52): 'For the understanding of Homer's poetry, German is a more important language than Serbo-Croatian'." (Garcia 2001: 68).
- d. "Though Africans were rarely perceived as a kind of ape, it was more commonly suggested that Africans and apes shared libidinous sexual characteristics or were sexually linked" (Jackson 2020:6).
